SEND Parent Termly Update - Summer 2021

Introduction

As we settle into the Summer holidays, I am pleased to share with you our third SEND progress update. Over 7,000 families received a copied of the spring edition.

As you will see in this update, we have tried to capture a flavour of our shared achievements over recent months as part of our plans to address the areas of weaknesses identified by Ofsted and the CQC in November 2019.

I'm particularly pleased to announce a significant £6.5million capital investment for the creation of over 100 SEND specialist places over the next 3 years. Building work to accommodate extra pupils will start over the summer holidays. The new places will be available at the start of the new term – September 2021.

We recently had another positive monitoring visit with our advisors at the Department of Education and NHS England. While we are encouraged that we are continuing to move in the right direction by our expert advisors, we are aware there still remains lots more work to do We remain focused on delivering great SEND services, and will not be satisfied with average.

Our SEND peer review also took place in early July. We shall be sharing our review letterwith you in the coming weeks. Again, the initial feedback was positive, recognising that we know ourselves and that improvements are being made in line with our Written Statement of Action Plan. The lead reviewer noted our operational lag, in other words the time lag which occurs between the right strategic actions being taken and the difference being felt on the ground by our children and their families. I understand how frustrating this, and can assure you that we are working hard to develop a more consistent approach and fully expect a step change to be felt from September, as our new staff begin to support families and schools in their roles as EHCP co ordinators and SEND advisory teachers.

We remain determined and committed to improving the lives of children and young people with SEND needs in Central Bedfordshire and are continuing to work with our key stakeholders to ensure we are listening and engaging with everyone who accesses and uses our services. We were proud to launch our first co-production charter with the input from pupils, parents and school staff. The Chiltern School deserves a special mention as they have produced a brilliant video to share their commitment to co-production. In the words of the young people – together is better.

Working with SNAP Parent/Carer Forum, we have co-produced a Pathological Demand Avoidance Position statement (PDA) as a direct response to parental concerns around challenges accessing support and recognition for children with a PDA profile. The statement was endorsed by a young person with a PDA profile, it has also received national recognition from the PDA society itself.

We have been strengthening our relationships with schools, and regular meetings are in place with heads of special school and schools with additional resource provisions. There has been a strong focus on improving regular engagement with SENCOs, including setting up termly study sessions for them to network, share best practice, learn about the latest information from other SEND professionals, and provide direct feedback on SEND services and school improvement.

Elsewhere, we have produced our draft Joint Strategic Needs Assessment, this document essentially helps us to plan, commission and deliver the right services for our children and young people. We will produce a summary document for parents and young people.

Developing an EHCP process that is fit for purpose has always been priority of the Service, In September we look forward to implementing our new EHCP plans and assessments, welcoming over 20 new staff and rolling out a new training programme. Parents can also expect us to promote and celebrate our Parent Pledge another initiative that demonstrates our drive to improve the way we work together. We will also be launching our new Local Offer website, an initiative which has taken years to achieve and will enable a more interactive approach.

'Freedom Day' clearly brings with it a different set of challenges; however, I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have worked with us throughout this pandemic to adjust and abide by the government regulations.

We have a rich programme of holiday activities for all as our Summer of Send begins and I'm sure you and your children will enjoy meeting up in a safe way to socialise and play together.

I hope you all have a great summer.

The council announces £6.5million capital investment in SEND schools over the next three years.

Pupils in Central Bedfordshire will benefit from a £6.5million capital funding in SEND schools provision over the next three years with most of the money (£3m) being spent in the coming academic school year 2021/22.

The capital funding will be spent on building new or improve existing space to accommodate the extra pupils.

The funds will create over 100 places, with 30 extra places at Ivel Valley (30 places), Chiltern (13 places), Weatherfield (10 places) and Lancot (6 places) schools planned this year.

We are working with two Multi Academy Trusts to increase Autistic Spectrum Disorder provision from September 2022 by a minimum of 30 places from Y1 to Y11 pupils in the academic year 2021/22.

The Council are pleased that the DfE also recognise the need for an investment in the authority and the £1.9m allocated, as part of the £6.5m million will support our plans to deliver new and improved services.

Early Help offers weekly support for parents

In response to parent requests that Children Centres are more accommodating to families who have children with SEND, regular coffee mornings for parents and carers with children with SEND are now in place.

The Early Years SEND team have recently started weekly groups for families with children with SEND who are still at home and will be starting preschool the next term.

The Home Start Peer Mentoring service is also offering support for families at an earlier stage of identification of need. The aim is for parents to feel supported emotionally and know how to get services to meet their child's needs and to access support groups etc including EPEC parenting course: 'Being a parent with ASD', run by parent volunteers.





Pupils, parents and professionals create new SEND Co-production charter

To celebrate Co-production Week (5-9 July) we launched our first Co-production charter.

The charter was developed following the feedback, views, and input from over 35 parents/carers, 145 young people with SEND, from 17 different schools and settings and professionals from health and social care services. The charter provides a collective commitment to joint working and implementing best practice when working with SEND children, young people, and parents across three key areas: effective communication, empowering people and being solution focused.





SENDTogether is better

The Chiltern School in Dunstable carried out several Coproduction activities throughout the project. The initiatives included the children with SEND designing a new local playground, reviewing communication, signage, and symbol in

the community, expressing their needs to practitioners to improve daily lives, and sharing their preferred physical activities.

The Chiltern School have cemented their commitment to Co-production by embedding a pupil voice day on a regularly basis as way of empowering their pupils. They have also produced a short video to demonstrate their experience and beneficial outcomes in developing the charter.

Maythorn residential home praised for outstanding features as it receives 'Good' Ofsted rating with no recommendations

Following a two-day inspection at the end of May the inspectors recognised the children make excellent progress because of their experiences of living at the home and awarded Maythorn with the 'Good' rating based on:

- overall experiences and progress of children and young people, considering
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ how well children and young people are helped and protected
- · and the effectiveness of leaders and managers.

The report stated that the staff are proactive in ensuring that children can express themselves using their preferred communication method, have well-structured routines and systems to make their wishes known helps the children to feel safe and move calmly from one activity to another.

The report also highlighted that during the inspection there was a genuine warmth between the staff and children, with lots of laughter. Maythorn works hard to support the children with communication, enabling them to understand what is going on around them.

Parents were equally complementary about Maythorn praising the staff for their patience, encouragement and sharing success with their children. A parent said, "The staff don't just care about [my child], they love him, and as a mum that is so important".

Maythorn is a residential home in Biggleswade, which provides both long term and shared care accommodation for young people aged 8 to 18 with autism, learning difficulties and associated complex needs.





Tom Smith, Maythorn Unit Manager said: "The outcome of this inspection is testament to the Maythorn team's commitment and dedication to the children we support. Throughout a challenging year they have continually strived to provide new opportunities, achievements and fond memories. A huge thank you from our young people to all of our Central Bedfordshire Council colleagues and the families we work with for all of their support, flexibility and understanding during difficult times, and for all of their wonderful feedback which Ofsted received as part of the inspection."

Cllr Sue Clark, Executive Member for Families, Education & Children, said: "This 'Good' Ofsted rating is down to collective efforts of everyone associate with Maythorn, all of whom have high aspirations for the pupils and want them to have the best start in life so they can reach their potential. I am delighted this has been recognised by Ofsted".

The purpose of a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) is to identify evidence in order to improve the health and wellbeing of the local community and reduce inequalities.

The breadth and depth of the 87 page SEND JSNA in Central Bedfordshire reflects the local commitment to delivering what all children, young adults and families with SEND need.

he JSNA findings, in the form of evidence, analysis of needs and agreed areas for commissioning and service delivery focus, will be used to help to determine what actions local authorities, the local NHS and other partners need to take to meet health and social care needs, and to address the wider issues that impact on health and wellbeing.

The documents have been contributed to by all local partners including parent representatives with an interest in working with the authorities to improve services. The parent representatives involved gave up their time to understand and be involved in the process, every comment submitted, and every amendment requested by a parent was included in the statement.

A summary version of the SEND JSNA will be available in the coming weeks.

Apply for a school holiday activity grant to support children with SEND

The Council's Short Breaks Grant Fund is now open. The Council is inviting voluntary organisations that provide holiday activities for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) to apply for funding.

The Short Breaks Grant Fund is open to voluntary organisations who:

- · will provide holiday activities for children and young people with SEND up to 1 April 2022
- · already has access to a site, or sites, that they can deliver their activities from

Each organisation can apply for a grant of up to a maximum of £10,000, with around £70,000 set aside overall.

The fund aims to encourage organisations from across the area to apply for a grant so that families who have children with SEND will have more choice and locations for social, leisure and play activities during the school holidays across the year.

Application process

Organisations are invited to apply by filling out an application form on the council's website and submitting it by email before the closing date of 5pm on Sunday 8 August. Applications will be assessed by a panel that will include representatives from Central Bedfordshire Council, parents, carers and young people. Each organisation will be informed of the outcome by 16 August 2021.

New Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Training Offer - live from September 2021!

As part of our commitment to improve training for practitioners who work with children and young people with SEND, we are increasing and centralising our learning offer on a Central Bedfordshire Learning platform which will be accessible via our Local Offer. This training and a range of resources will also be accessible for parents/ carers.

New Staff, New roles!

In Central Bedfordshire, families are at the heart of all we do and we want to ensure that all Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) are of a consistent high quality and reflect the needs and aspirations of children and young people with **SEND In Central Bedfordshire.**

We also recognise the importance of high quality and timely Annual Reviews to make sure that children and young people's outcomes and progress is monitored, and their needs are responded to. As part of our response to this, we have increased our workforce and have some new dedicated roles across our SEND Teams starting in post between July and September 2021. We would like to share these new roles with you and the benefit these roles will bring for families with SEND and partners across Central Bedfordshire...

There is much more work underway to support the improvement of quality of EHCPs and outcomes for children and young people with SEND. Watch out for more information to be shared soon including:

New EHCP Co-ordinators

We have 6 new EHCP co-ordinators joining us from July 2021, these coordinators will work closely with families and partners to co-produce a high quality EHCP for a child/ young person. The benefits of these roles include:


- · Parents/ carers and young people will have a consistent point of contact who can explain what to expect, and keep families involved and informed of progress.
- There will be consistent and clear coordination of advice for professionals and services that need to input into a child or young person's EHCP.
- · Parents/ carers will feel involved in their child's/ young person's plan and be satisfied that it reflects their needs before being finalised through co-production from start to finish.

New SEND Specialist Advisory Teachers (SSATs)

We have 3 new SEND Specialist Advisory Teachers (SSATs) joining our team from September 2021. These teachers have a key role and will work closely with schools and partners across Central Bedfordshire to:

- Support in monitoring outcomes for children and young people with EHCPs in schools and educational settings.
- Support the quality and timeliness of Annual Reviews.
- Identify areas of learning and support high quality practice across the area.

Transport update

The Council recently held a public consultation on the reviewed Home to School Travel Assistance policies and the new 19+ Travel Assistance Policy.

The feedback has been considered and adjustments made to the policies and the final versions are now going through governance to be considered by the Executive Committee early in August.

If they are approved by the Committee they will be implemented for new travel assistance applications received from September 2021. The new policies will not impact on the eligibility for travel assistance of any child who is currently receiving travel assistance. Further communications on the policies will be published from mid-August.





Weatherfield students strike the right beat in drum project

In the Spring half term pupils from Weatherfield Academy took part in an innovative drumming project which sets out to show improvements in physical ability and emotional behaviour among special school pupils following a period of drumming practice.

This novel research was undertaken was developed and overseen through the contributions by Prof Steve Draper (Hartpury University), Dr Ruth Lowry (University of Essex), Dr Marcus Smith (University of Chichester) and other colleagues at the Clem Burke Drumming Project (www.clemburkedrummingproject.org). Laura Park, Joint Commissioning Manager for Central Bedfordshire Children's Services & Bedfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group, took the lead in developing and securing the funds to support the project. The results from the research will be shared over the coming months.



Michael Dodson from Inspiring Music said, "I was inspired by the positivity and determination of all the students who took part in this intensive course. They all made exceptional progress."





The Council's co-produced **Pathological Demand Avoidance** (PDA) Position Statement receives national recognition

Our Pathological Demand Avoidance position statement has been nationally recognised as a shining example of good practice by the PDA society.

PDA is to difficult to diagnose as PDA individuals share autistic characteristics and several other symptoms including:

- · Resisting and avoiding the ordinary demands of life
- · using social strategies as part of avoidance e.g., distracting, giving excuses
- appearing sociable but may lack understanding
- · experiences excessive mood swings and impulsivity
- appearing more comfortable in imaginative and role play
- displays obsessive behaviour that is often focused on other

The position statement which was coproduced in collaboration with the SNAP Parent Carer forum (SNAP PCF) and professionals across the health and social care sector provides reassurance and recognises the need for extra support to children and families affected by PDA.

We are collaborating with SNAP PCF to develop a training programme for professionals across social care and education settings working with SEND children. The training programme will be available from the autumn term 2021.
